Earning Merit Badges







- Opportunities for earning Merit Badges (currently 137 MBs!)
- Earning Merit Badges on your own (with a buddy)

 Only the MBC can mark off requirements, parents cannot!
- Merit Badges you can do on your own and those you can't

- Our Troop offers Merit Badges throughout the year, upcoming:
 - Art, Woodwork, Scholarship, Nuclear Science, Astronomy
 - Open to any Scout
 - Advanced Eagle-required MBs: Personal Fitness, Personal Management, Family Life
 - Restricted to 1st Class and up (best with more maturity/wisdom)
- Other easy opportunities for earning Merit Badges:
 - Winter Swim January and February Swimming / Lifesaving
 - Merit Badge Universities
 - Troop 119 January / February, Troop 2860 March
 - VAHC Spring Camporee April/May
 - Summer Camp June or July



Earning Merit Badges on Your Own (with a buddy)



- 1. Pick a Merit Badge, click "Start a new MB" in Scoutbook
- 2. Click "Invite a Counselor" to find local MBCs (ask SM/AC if this option does not show for you in Scoutbook)
 - Don't pick someone outside our Troops without asking SM 1st
- 3. Find a buddy or two to work with you
- 4. Get permission to <u>start</u> from the Scoutmaster <u>EMAIL them</u>!
 - No work you did before this date can be counted
- 5. Work with the MBC to complete the badge
 - Can meet during Troop meetings or at other times with 2 adults and at least 2 Scouts
 - Only the MBC can mark off requirements in Scoutbook, parents cannot!
- 6. Have MBC and SM sign you off in Scoutbook when done
- 7. If you got a blue card, give it to our Advancement Chair
 - Currently Mr. Dozier

- Our Troops currently have MBCs for almost all Merit Badges (and ALL Eagle-required) with the exception of the following:
 - American Labor
 - Animation
 - Archery
 - Auto Maintenance
 - Composite Materials
 - Dentistry
 - Farm Mechanics
 - Leatherwork
 - Metalwork

- Mining in Society
- Pottery
- Pulp and Paper
- Rifle Shooting
- Search and Rescue
- Shotgun Shooting
- Soil/Water Conservation
- Surveying
- Truck Transportation
- Weather
- Not all listed MBCs have completed all their paperwork, so check with your Scoutmaster first before talking to them





Earning Merit Badges – Troop Rules to Remember - 1



- You can't even <u>start</u> until you get approval from your SM
 - Scoutmaster will make sure you have an approved MBC
 - <u>No work you did before this date can be counted</u>
- You MUST work with a buddy and an approved MBC
 - This means you can't work on MBs by yourself, even if your parent is an approved MBC
 - Only exception: you're a procrastinating Life Scout struggling to make Eagle at the last minute – plan with your Scoutmaster
 - Only the MBC can mark off requirements in Scoutbook, parents cannot!
- Parents don't make the ideal MBC
 - Parents can be too easy on you, or you might try to trick them
 - Our preference is that if at all possible, you work with an approved MBC who is NOT your parent
 - Get to know the other cool adults in our Troops!



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- You must produce adequate <u>evidence</u> to show to your MBC to <u>prove</u> you have done the required work
 - There are <u>no shortcuts</u> for requirements, so watch for these keywords and obey them:
 - "Discuss/explain with your counselor ..."
 - "Do research ..."
 - "Build and show ..."
 - "Write down ..."
 - "Give a presentation to ..."
 - Although not required, the Scouts BSA Merit Badge Workbooks are a great way to record your evidence to show to your MBC
 - Only the MBC can mark off requirements in Scoutbook, parents cannot!
- If you show your MBC no hard evidence, then don't expect to get the badge duh!









- Some Merit Badges require specially certified instructors, so we don't want you to do these on your own and the Troop does not offer them:
 - Archery
 - Rifle Shooting
 - Shotgun Shooting
 - These are offered primarily at Summer Camp
- Remember that a MBC can also help you finish off a partial Merit Badge
 - Maybe you did all but one requirement at Summer Camp, and just need someone to sign that off when you finish





Earning Merit Badges – Troop Rules to Remember - 4



- Some Merit Badges we periodically teach to groups within the Troops, so we don't want you to do these on your own:
 - Citizenship in the Community
 - Personal Management (90 days)
 - Personal Fitness (90 days)
 - Family Life (90 days)
 - Cooking
- Most of these are also more beneficial to take when you are older/wiser – restricted to 1st Class and above
- Only exception: you're a procrastinating Life Scout struggling to make Eagle at the last minute
 - Work out a plan with your Scoutmaster!



Earning Merit Badges – Troop Rules to Remember - 5



- Like most things in Scouts BSA, you can't double count something you did <u>once</u> to get credit for <u>two</u> requirements
 - Unless the MB book says you can take credit for something you did for rank advancement or another MB, you have to do it again
 - Can a bird house I made for Woodwork MB also count as a project for Bird Study MB?
 - Can a speech I gave for First Class count for Communication MB?
 - Remember <u>nothing you did before the official MB start date</u> can be counted, although the only time limit on finishing once you start is reaching age 18
- Confused or have questions?
 - Talk to your Scoutmaster and work out a plan







Information for Applicant

- A merit badge application can be approved only by a registered merit badge counselor.
- You must have a buddy with you (Scout buddy system) at each meeting with the merit badge counselor.
- Turn in your approved application to your unit leader. You will be awarded the merit badge emblem and certificate at a suitable occasion.

Information for Counselor

- Merit badge applications must be signed in advance by the applicant's unit leader.
- The Scout must have his buddy (Scout buddy system) in attendance at all instructional sessions.
- You may not change any requirement, but you may share your knowledge or experience that will make the counseling more interesting and valuable.

If you have a partial, he will list the ones you completed, and mark which ones you still need to complete

Adults: Process for Becoming a Merit Badge Counselor - 1



1. Complete Scouts BSA adult application including background check authorization signature, position code 42 Merit Badge Counselor (this position is no charge to the Troops). I can give you at any meeting, or it is available on-line here:

- 2. MBC form for whatever badges you would like to teach (list on a separate sheet if you run out of room). Find it here:
 - <u>https://filestore.scouting.org/filestore/pdf/34405.pdf</u>
 - Note that you can elect to work with ONLY Scouts in our two Troops, or anyone within our Council / District who may need a MBC. Once the paperwork is in, folks can find you via Scoutbook if you select a wider help option.









- 3. Your on-line Youth Protection Training (YPT) completion certificate from www.my.scouting.org
 - Note that YPT must be re-taken annually
- 4. Your on-line MBC Training completion certificate from www.my.scouting.org
 - This is a one-time course, no need to retake it if you have already completed and can print your training certificate
- Once these four items are in, you are good to go with teaching Merit Badge classes or helping to clear partials.
